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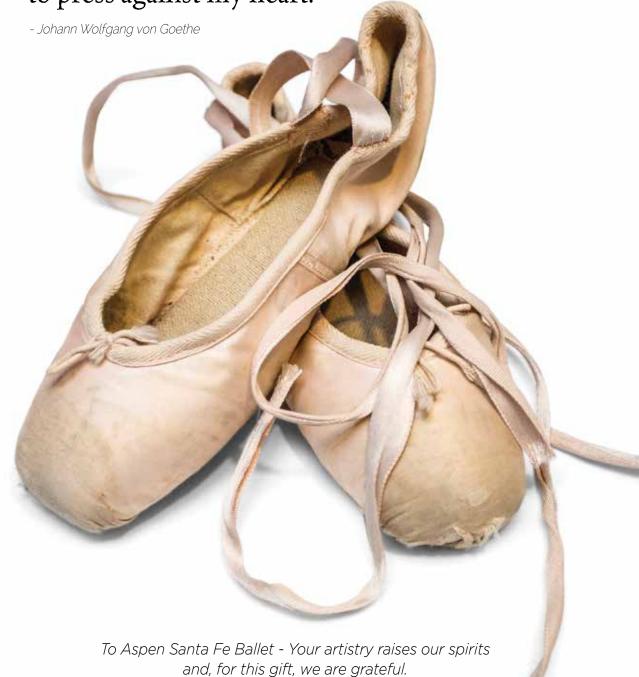






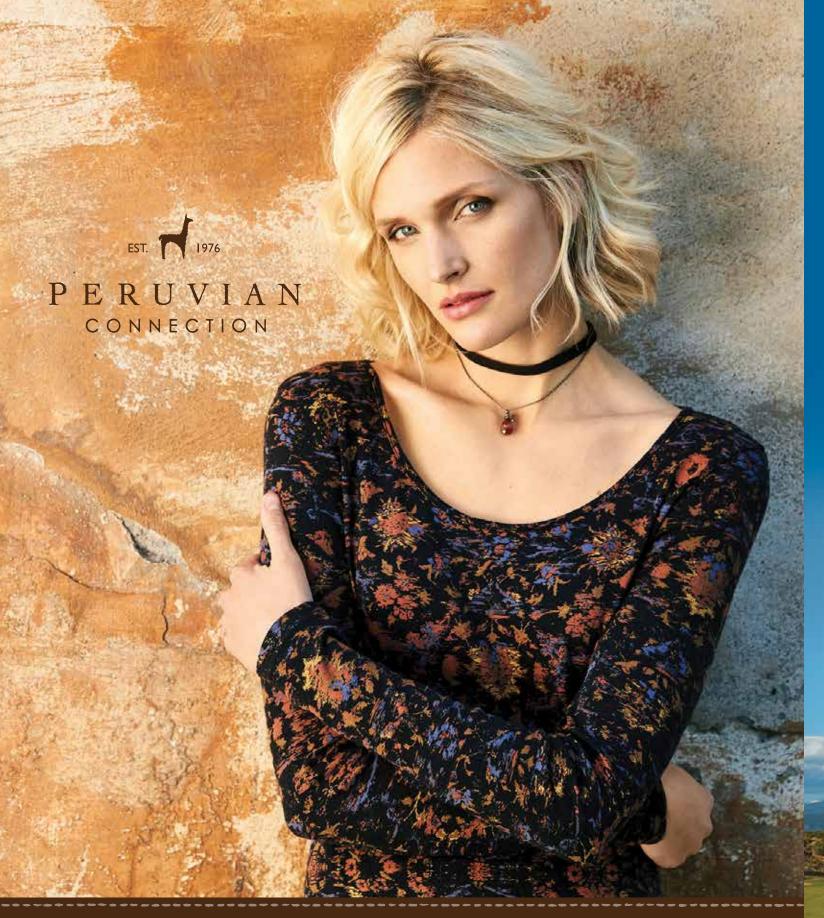


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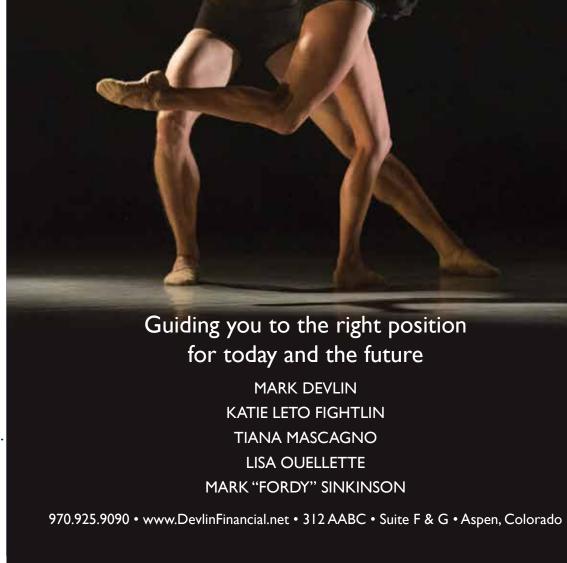


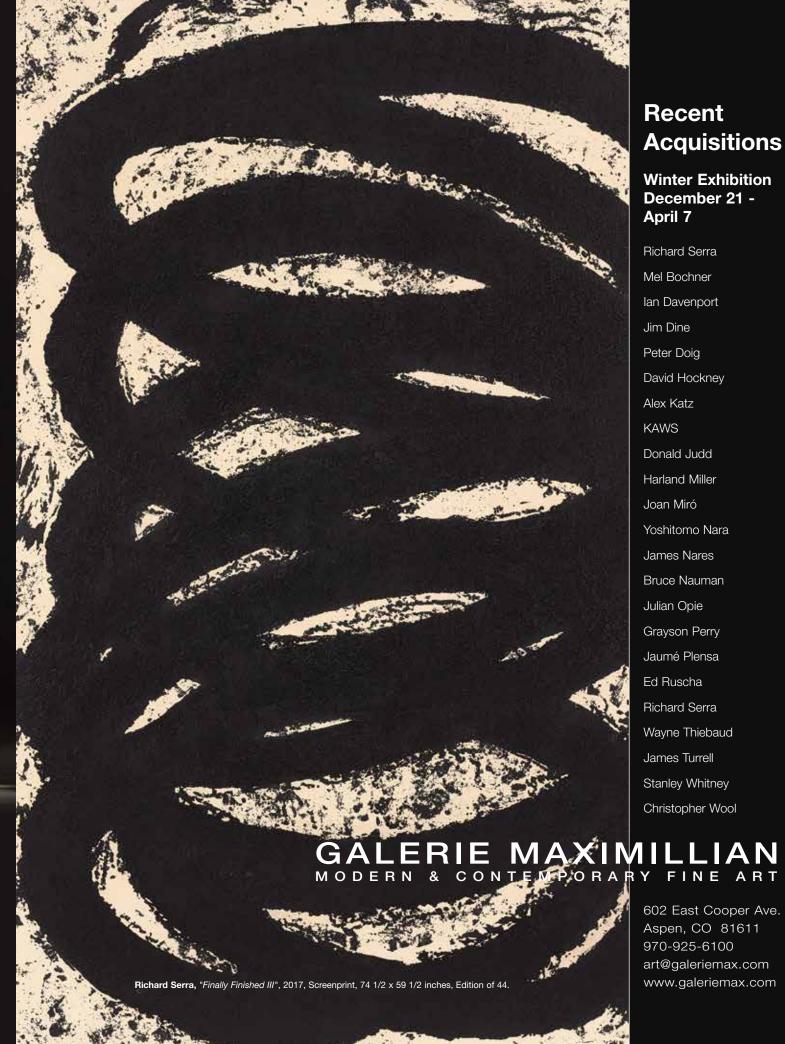
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FROMTHE DIRECTORS

Dear Friends,

It is our great pleasure to welcome you to this performance by Aspen Santa Fe Ballet. We exist for our audiences, as your applause fills our dancers' hearts. For the past 23 seasons, ASFB performances have fed the souls of thousands of people each year. We are humbled by the hundreds of individuals, foundations, government agencies, and businesses who continue to support our work.

This sustenance has brought real results: ASFB is a force in the field of contemporary dance. Every year, our exuberant company travels the nation—in the next months taking command of stages in Dallas, Los Angeles, Scottsdale, and New York City—to inspire audiences with their artistry. In overseas tours, we proudly serve as ambassadors for our arts-aware communities of Aspen and Santa Fe. We are happy to announce that Aspen Santa Fe Ballet has been invited back to Israel. The tour includes six performances in Tel-Aviv, a global dance capital, as well as appearances in Yagur, Modiin, and Jerusalem.

Hundreds of children from The School of ASFB work side-by-side with our professional dancers, learning the craft of the stage. Twenty additional performers join our ranks to fill the enormous cast of dancers and actors.

This coming summer, we are thrilled to bring our audiences something fresh and new. For the first time, our dancers will take on the challenge of an evening-length, abstract work, *Beautiful Decay*, by choreographer Nicolo Fonte. This expansive ballet challenges notions of beauty and youth and ruminates on whether true beauty can ever fade. Set to Vivaldi's iconic *The Four Seasons*, it has a distinguished set design by Tony Award-winning designer Mimi Lien.

The poignancy of *Beautiful Decay* serves as an apt metaphor for Aspen Santa Fe Ballet today. For the last two decades, the company has proven its capacity for rejuvenation, as young dancers inject fresh energy to fortify the talent of our seasoned dancers, and new ballets encourage exploration and innovation. 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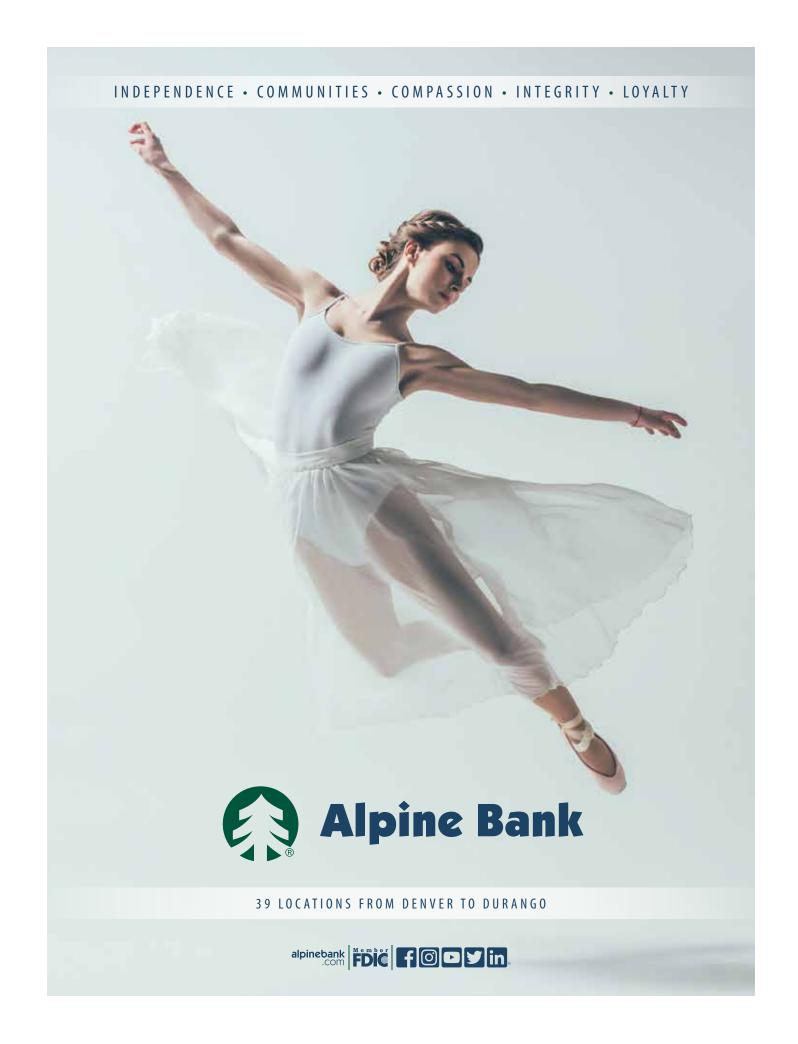
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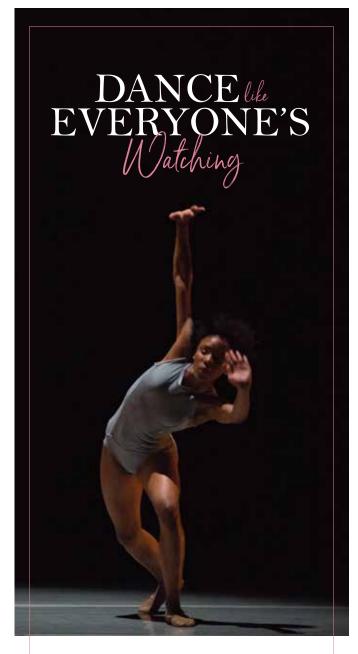
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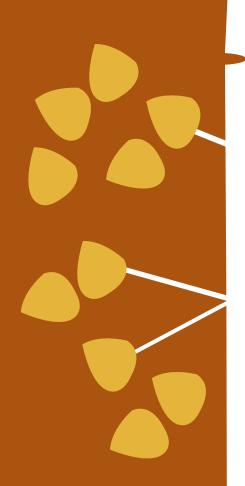
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A MOVING MEDITATION

Beautiful Decay and Aspen Santa Fe Ballet



horeographer Nicolo Fonte's innovative Beautiful

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Inspired by photographer Mark Golebiowski's larger-than-life, three-dimensional photos of flowers in varying states of withered-ness, Fonte's *Beautiful Decay* investigates, questions, and literally embraces the cyclical nature of life, ultimately shattering conventional conceptions of usefulness, validity, and beauty. In pluralistically compelling alignment with the Chinese concept of yin and yang, and the West African notion embodied in the Twi word "sankofa"—meaning "go back and get," or "to seek and take"—Fonte's ornate, intricate, and detail-focused movement references baroque extravagance, taking dancers and audience members through an odyssey that is forever driven by a question fertile with answers: just how does one's perception of the physical self evolve as the body (albeit with imperceptible gradualness) suffers the inevitable erosion rendered by time?

Beautiful Decay tackles the question through Fonte's adroit use of the Aspen Santa Fe Ballet's young, eager, open, and virtuosic dancers, in tandem juxtaposition with internationally-acclaimed and seasoned dance artists Hilary Cartwright and Gregory Bielemeier. Cartwright is a former soloist and ballet mistress of Britain's Royal Ballet and director

of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet and Netherlands Dance Theatre Junior Company. Cartwright is a frequent guest of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet, making yearly trips to coach ASFB dancers and rehearse the company for the classical demands of the annual production of *The Nutcracker*.

Ms. Cartwright's participation in *Beautiful Decay* has something of the serendipitous, and merits mention here. While the ballet was originally choreographed in 2013 on BalletX. Fonte always held the image and idea of Hilary Cartwright as the ideal "prototype" for the female component. Says Fonte: "Every time I thought of who I wanted to set the movement on, every time I closed my eyes and imagined what that might look like, I kept coming back to Hilary, who is really the epitome of the archetypical ballet dancer—thin, delicate and waif-like, theatrical, and sensitive."

In this, the ballet's latest iteration, Hillary Cartwright's debut in the role could very well wind up being Fonte's proverbial oyster, granting him the opportunity to see his initial inkling come to life on stage—a dream come true, so to speak.

Joining Hilary Cartwright as partner in crime (and here's

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the conundrum: is it a crime to grow old, or is age itself the criminal?) is choreographer, performer, and teacher Gregg Bielemeier. Still a moving force to reckon with, the Oregon native began his dance career with Portland Dance Theater in 1970, later moving to San Francisco, Amsterdam, then back to Portland over twenty-three years of pedagogy, crafting, and performing dances.

While Cartwright has remained a "fantastical" character in *Beautiful Decay*, at least until the ASFB company debut this summer, Bielemeier actually covered the male role in 2015, when Fonte set the piece on Oregon Ballet Theatre, where Fonte described him as a dynamic performer with formidable physical presence. By including these seasoned dance artists in the same work as the more typically youthful ballet dancers, *Beautiful Decay* serves as a sort of shape-shifting container for a movement meditation dedicated to the thoughts and processes in and around the multi-faceted subject of aging.

Another important particularity with the upcoming Aspen Santa Fe Ballet production of *Beautiful Decay* lies in two cue words: quality and quantity, which combine to equal relationship. Fonte's dance work about age, beauty, perception, and point-of-view marks his tenth collaboration with the company, so he comes to them—and they to him—with a true sense of knowingness and a deep trust, in both the physical and emotional spheres. He has high expectations, which the dancers have never failed to meet. Audiences are sure to find transport and enthrallment through the choreographic material and the splendid execution by a company of skilled, engaged, and dedicated performers.

Again, one cannot help but recognize the parallels with aging: fine wine, expertise, deep, meaningful relationships. All of these things require time; they don't just blossom overnight! The fact, too, that *Beautiful Decay* has been performed multiple times by different companies with different guest castings affords choreographer Fonte the wonderful



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opportunity to watch his creation grow and develop through observation of stylistically diverse modes of movement and distinct choices in the emotional interpretation of the piece.

This very broad panorama presents the possibility of near and far-sightedness all at once, a priceless gift for both Fonte and the Aspen Santa Fe Ballet dancers under his tutelage. Knowingness and vision: a pairing that speaks volumes.

With a musical score of Vivaldi's iconic *The Four Seasons* as accompaniment to the first part of the ballet, Fonte's staging has dancers moving in one direction only—from stage left to stage right—and the marked allusion to the concept of

time's passing is unmistakable. The second half of the ballet uses Max Richter's remix of the same, as well as Icelandic composer Olafur Arnalds' popular songs. The company dances separately from the couple, in pairs with the couple, and together with all intermingling on stage. There you have it—life, in all its possible combinations, ebbing and flowing through a constantly shifting stream. It's stop and go, give and take, follow and lead, assist and be assisted, holding back and bringing forth, discovering when and how, listening and understanding, combatting and acquiescing, embracing it all: the good, the bad, the ugly, and the beautiful.



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ASPEN SANTA FE BALLET HISTORY



Ballet's dynamic story in the American West

In 1996, Aspen Santa Fe Ballet Founder Bebe Schweppe invited Tom Mossbrucker and Jean-Philippe Malaty to create a ballet company in Aspen. A unique, multidimensional arts organization developed rapidly from the ballet school Schweppe had established in the Rocky Mountains. "Bebe's vision for Aspen to have its own ballet company was the project of a lifetime," says Malaty, ASFB's Executive Director. "We embarked together on a serendipitous adventure. More than twenty years later, the connection between the dancers and our two communities is deep and inextricable."

Forging a new frontier

The company began modestly with seven dancers. Growth was organic. Friends in the field—Gerald Arpino, Trey McIntyre, Septime Webre, Dwight Rhoden—offered start-up repertoire. Moses Pendleton's popular *Noir Blanc* was a seminal event for the young ASFB. It launched a tradition of commissioning new works. An open, exploratory style emerged as Mossbrucker and Malaty tapped the creative scene in Europe where classical ballet was breaking from its boundaries. The athletic and adventurous American dancers found themselves at a crossroads of dance history. The divide between ballet and modern dance was dissolving.

Innovative business model

In 2000, the Aspen, Colorado-based ballet company forged a dual-city relationship with Santa Fe, New Mexico, broadening its scope and lending crucial revenue diversification. Under this hybrid business model, a roster of arts activities flourishes year-round in both cities. Performance, education, presentation, and community outreach all join in the mix. In 2014, ASFB shared resources with a local troupe, Juan Siddi Flamenco Santa Fe (JSFSF). This entrepreneurial project led to artistic heights at Jacob's Pillow and New York's Joyce Theater. Fortified with new experience and relationships, JSFSF continues to thrive in its own right.

New commissions

ASFB's mission places highest priority on developing new dance works and nurturing relationships with emerging

choreographers. The company fostered the early careers of now in-demand global dance makers like Nicolo Fonte (eight commissioned Fonte works in the ASFB repertoire), Jorma Elo (four commissioned Elo works), Edwaard Liang, Jacopo Godani, Helen Pickett, Cayetano Soto, Alejandro Cerrudo, and others. Works by late 20th century masters—William Forsythe, Jiří Kylián, Twyla Tharp—round out the repertoire.

"We value building relationships with choreographers who become integral to the company. The natural beauty of our surroundings has a profound impact on creativity. Our choreographers find it inspiring to create here," says Mossbrucker, ASFB's Artistic Director.

Renowned in the U.S. & abroad

Based in the American West, ASFB occupies the vanguard of its field, brandishing a strong national reputation. Repeat engagements at the American Dance Festival, Harris Theater for Music and Dance, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Joyce Theater, The Kennedy Center, Saratoga Performing Arts Center, and Wolf Trap testify to the company's popularity and ability to please audiences. The company has toured overseas as well, with prestigious invitations and bookings in Brazil, Canada, France, Greece, Guatemala, Israel, Italy, and Russia. Premier funders—National Endowment for the Arts, New England Foundation for the Arts / National Dance Project, Joyce Foundation, Shubert Foundation, Wolf Trap Foundation, Jerome Robbins Foundation, and Princess Grace Foundation—have supported ASFB's growth.

Into a bright future

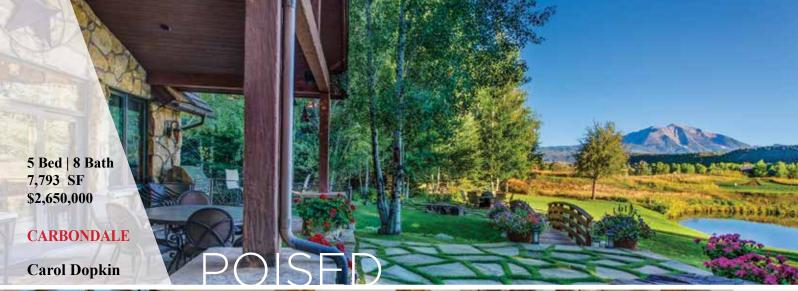
Since its founding in 1996, ASFB has carved a reputation as a dance-lover's dance company. It has genuinely reshaped the field, introducing new choreographic talent to national stages, fostering a new breed of exceptional dancer, and stimulating audiences with high-caliber performances. Fueled by an annual budget of over \$4 million and an endowment nearly twice that size, the company's strong artistic vision is supported by solid financial footing.

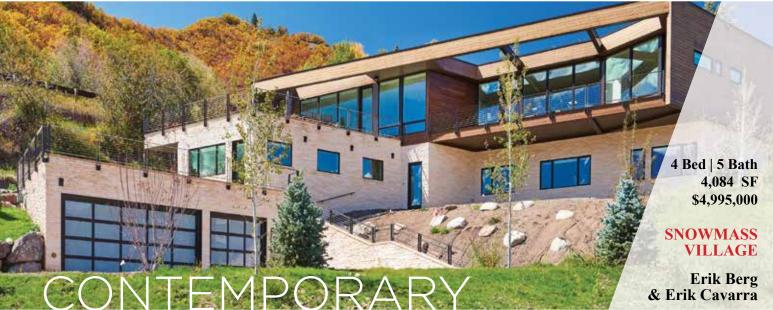
















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DIRECTOR BIOGRAPHIES



JEAN-PHILIPPE MALATY FXFCUTIVE DIRECTOR

Jean-Philippe was born in the Basque region of France; after receiving his baccalaureate in dance, he accepted scholarships to study at Mudra, Maurice Béjart's school in Brussels, and at John Cranko's ballet academy in Stuttgart. Invited by acclaimed instructor David Howard to study in New York, Jean-Philippe traveled to America under Howard's tutelage. Jean-Philippe's performance career began with Joffrey II. He also danced as a guest artist with Los Angeles Classical Ballet, Ballet Hispanico, and the Lyric Opera of Chicago. Jean-Philippe segued from the stage to an administrative role while still in his twenties. A key member of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet's start-up team, Jean-Philippe has been central to developing the company's unique dual-city-based hybrid business model. He directs operations in two locations, overseeing a \$4 million budget that he allocates to the company, two schools, an esteemed presenting series, and an award-winning folkloric outreach program. Jean-Philippe's first love is teaching and, when his schedule permits, he conducts master classes at schools and universities. He has served on panels for the Colorado Council for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts. In 2013, Jean-Philippe shared an honor with Artistic Director Tom Mossbrucker when the Santa Fe Community Foundation bestowed its Piñon Award on the company. In 2012, the Denver-based Bonfils-Stanton Foundation granted Jean-Philippe a Livingston Fellowship in recognition of his significant leadership role in Colorado's non-profit sector. In 2010, in recognition of ASFB's contribution to the field of dance, Jean-Philippe and Tom were honored with the Joyce Theater Foundation Award. A naturalized U.S. citizen, Jean-Philippe is proud to have forged a company alive with American energy, invention, and eclecticism.

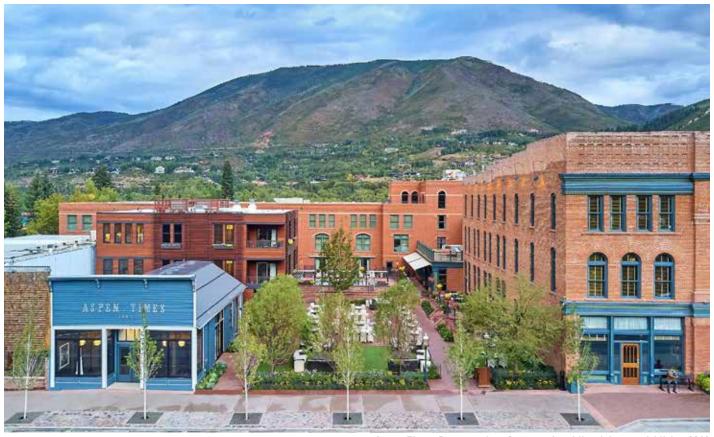


TOM MOSSBRUCKER ARTISTIC DIRECTOR

Tom has been artistic director of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet since 1996. Over the course of his career, he has built a prestigious arts organization sharing two homes in Aspen and Santa Fe. In his role as artistic director, Tom cultivates highly sophisticated and challenging works of contemporary ballet. His shining achievement is ASFB's roster of over 30 ballets created on commission by leading global choreographers. Tom began to dance at age four, studying tap in his hometown of Tacoma, Washington. He pursued classical ballet training at the School of American Ballet and Joffrey Ballet School. His 20 years as a principal dancer with the Joffrey Ballet, performing in over 70 ballets under the direct coaching of founders Robert Joffrey and Gerald Arpino, coincided with a period of high artistic achievement for the company. Tom danced in ballets by great twentieth century choreographers: Fredrick Ashton, George Balanchine, Laura Dean, William Forsythe, Jiří Kylián, Mark Morris, Paul Taylor, and Twyla Tharp. Signature roles included lago in Jose Limon's *The Moor's Pavane*; Champion Roper in Agnes DeMille's *Rodeo*; Billy in Eugene Loring's Billy the Kid; and Romeo in John Cranko's Romeo and Juliet. It is this rich dance background that Tom brings to coaching dancers today. In 2013, Tom shared an honor with Executive Director Jean-Philippe Malaty when the Santa Fe Community Foundation bestowed its Piñon Award on the company. In 2010, in recognition of ASFB's contribution to the field of dance, Tom and Jean-Philippe were honored with the Joyce Theater Foundation Award. A former board member of Dance USA, Tom currently serves on the board of The Gerald Arpino and Robert Joffrey Foundation.

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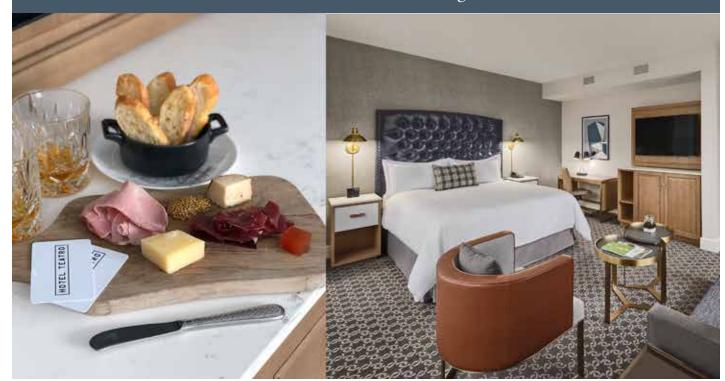


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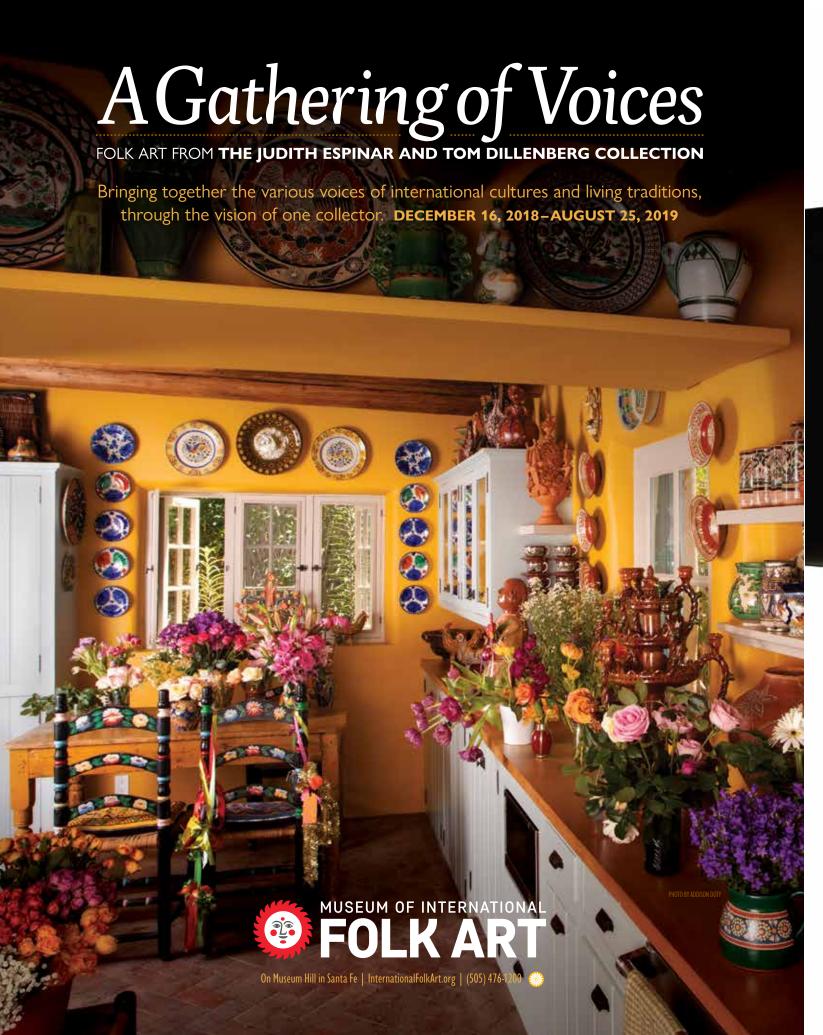


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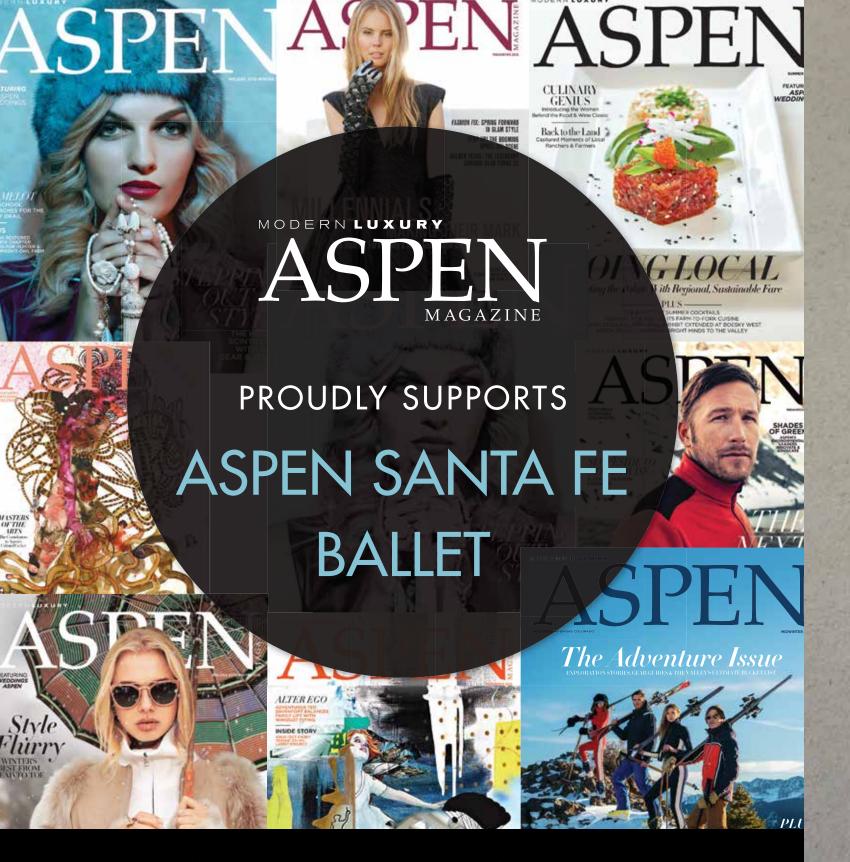
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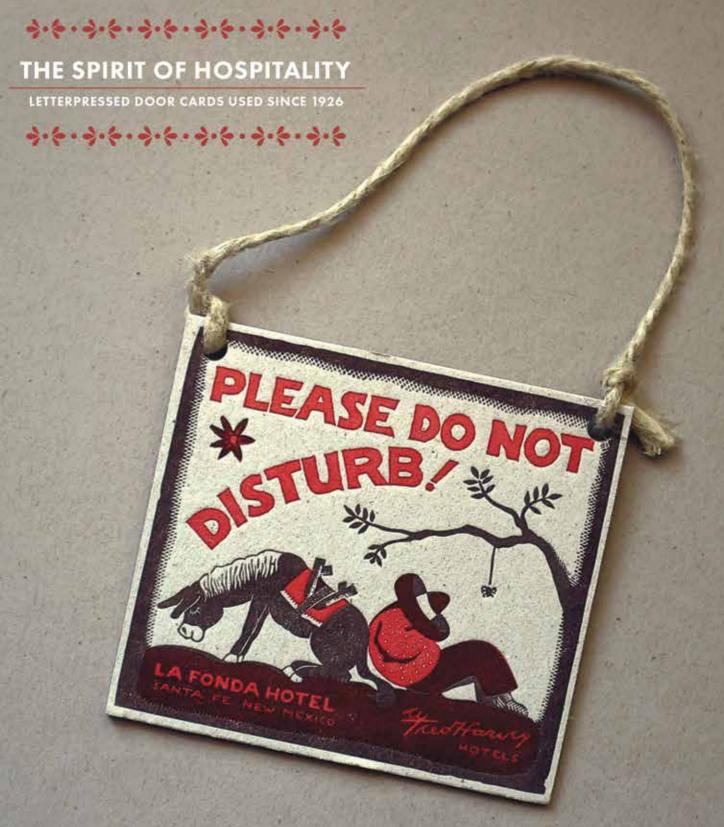




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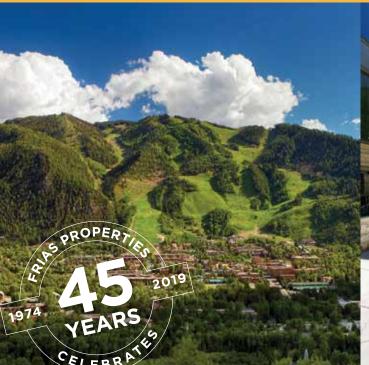




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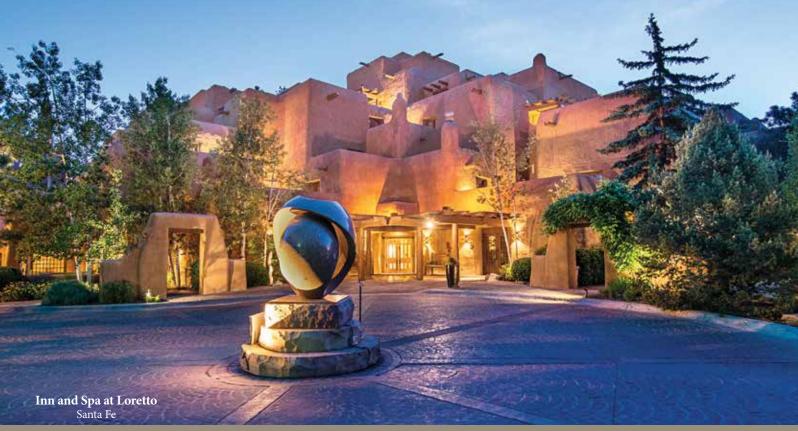
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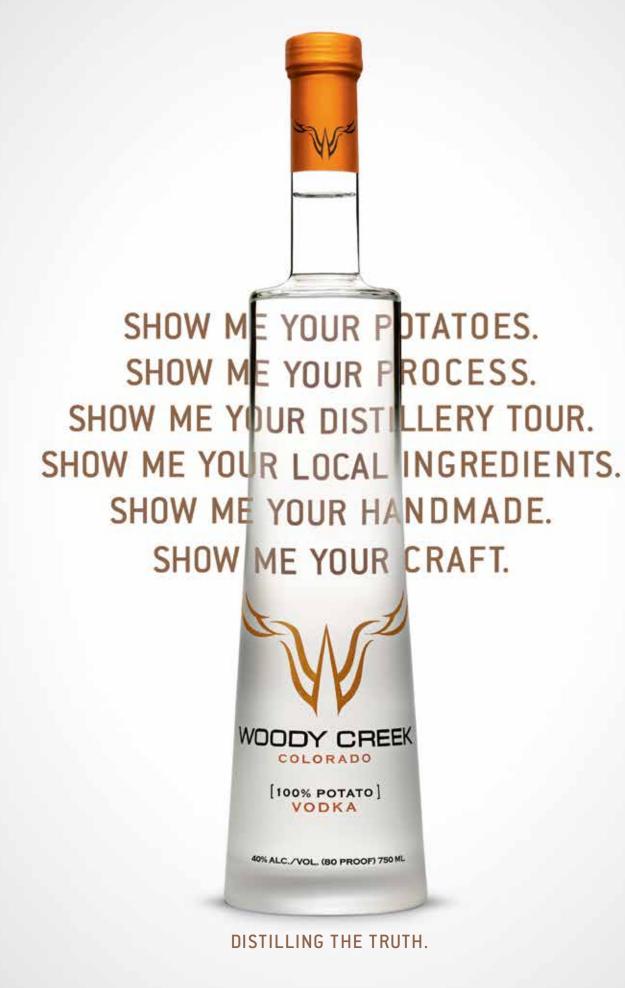
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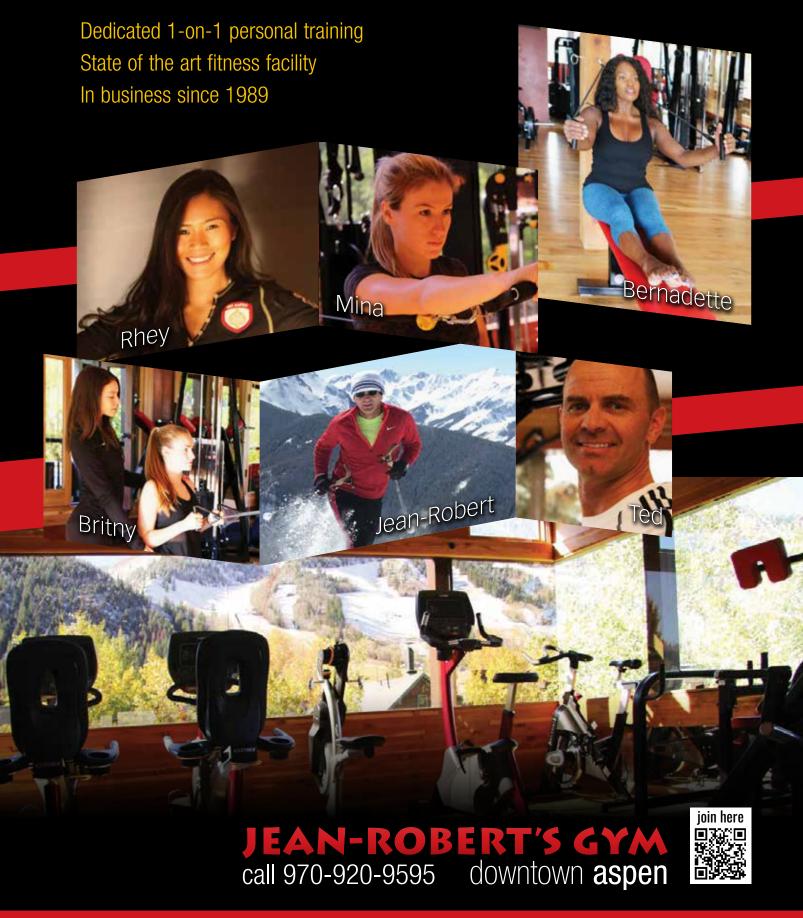






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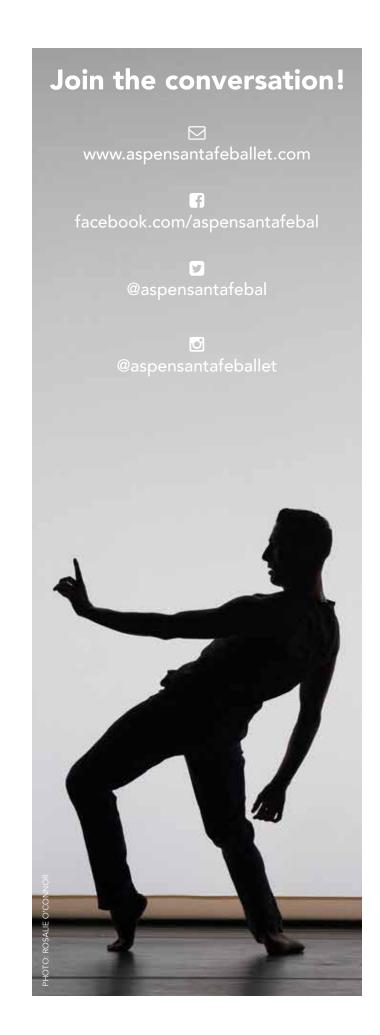
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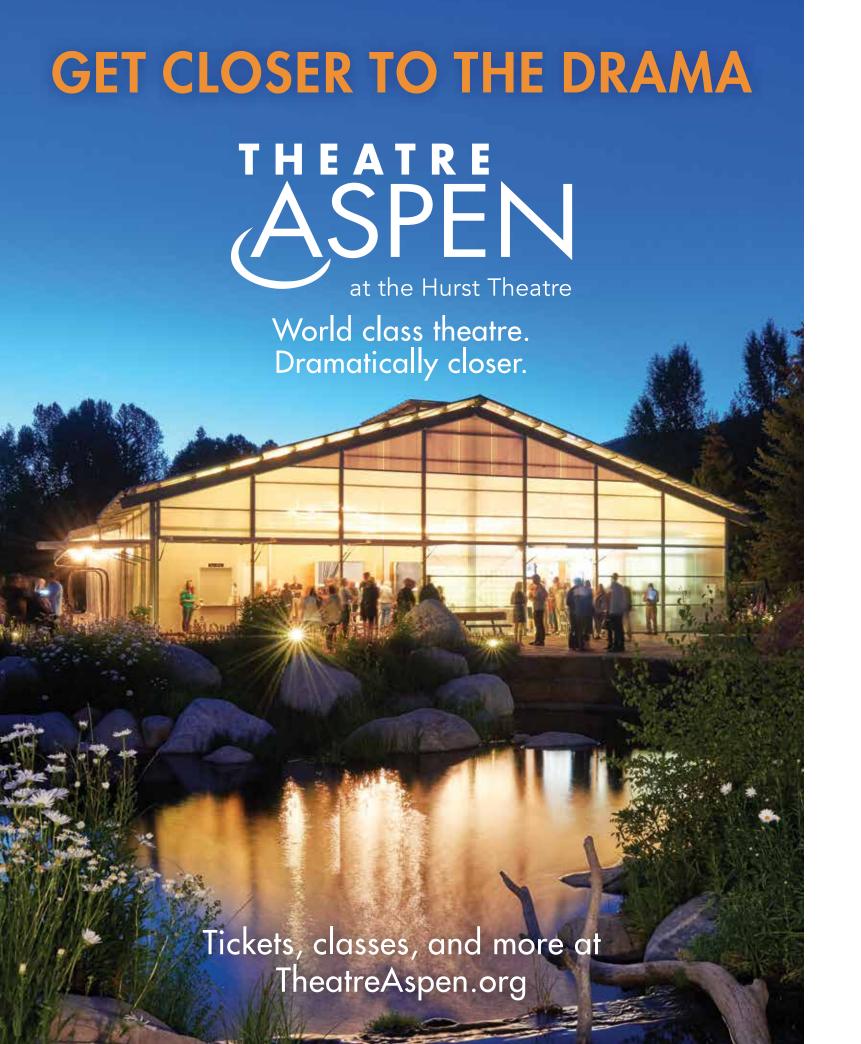
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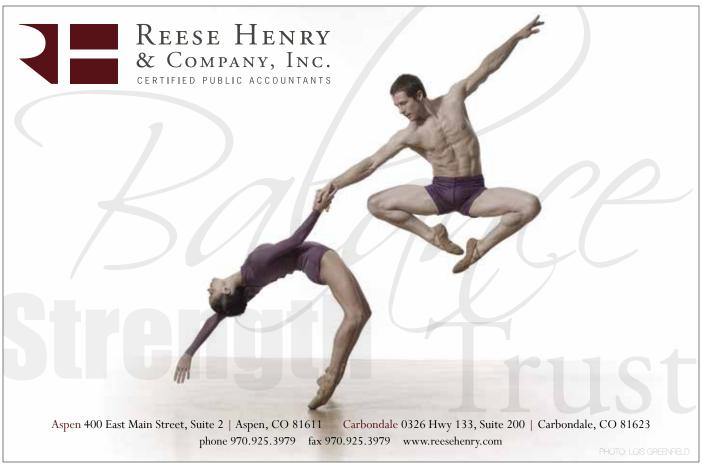
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MELANIE DOSKOCIL SCHOOL DIRECTOR

GISELA GENSCHOW SCHOOL DIRECTOR

Gisela is the director and principal teacher of The School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet in Santa Fe. A

native of Hamburg, Germany, she trained with the Hamburg State Opera under Peter van Dyk and Victor Gsovsky. She danced professionally with the Hamburg State Opera, Ballet de Wallonie, Opera de Lyon, Ballet Theatre Contemporain, Ballet du Rhin, and Tanzforum Koln. Throughout her career she toured Europe performing both classical ballets and contemporary works. She had the opportunity to work directly with George Balanchine as well as other renowned choreographers such as Pierre Lacotte and Lois Falco. After moving to the United States, Gisela was a faculty member of Fort Worth Ballet, Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre under company director Patricia Wilde, and the New World School of the Arts in Miami. In 1992, she moved to Santa Fe and took over the directorship of Santa Fe Dance Foundation, now The School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet.

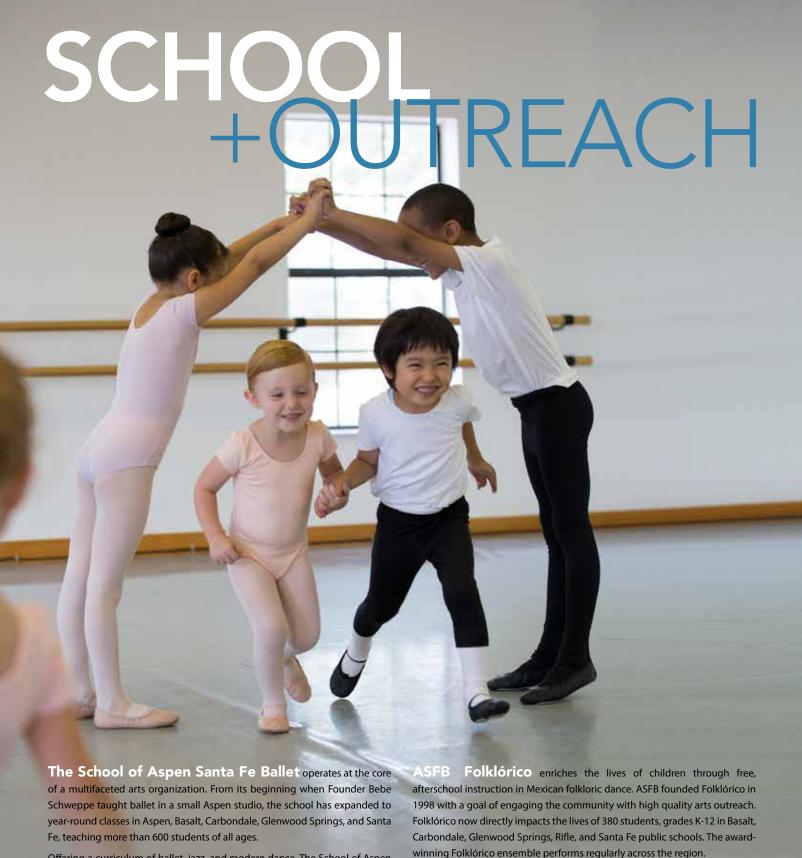

Francisco (Paco) Nevárez-Burgueño became part of Compania de Danza

Folklórica in Chihuahua, Mexico at the age of 14, dancing from 1978 to 1990 under the direction of Leonor Avalos Zaragoza. During this time, he learned a large repertoire of traditional and popular Mexican dances, costume design, choreography, lighting and set design. After immigrating to the US in 1990, Nevarez-Burgueño founded his own Folklórico dance company for adults and children in the New York City metro area, Mexico: Images and Traditions Folkloric Group. He was also the Princeton University Ballet Folklórico Artistic Director from 2000 to 2002. ASFB recruited Nevárez-Burgueño in 2002 to direct the Folklórico after-school program; the program has won numerous awards and accolades under his leadership. In 2016 Colorado Creative Industries recognized Nevárez-Burgueño with its Governor's Creative Leadership Award.





Offering a curriculum of ballet, jazz, and modern dance, The School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet provides quality training for the pre-professional student as well as the recreational dancer, and has guided many young dancers into professional careers. The school fosters a supportive environment that enhances confidence and accomplishment in addition to technique and artistry. Students perform in an annual spring recital and alongside ASFB's professional dancers in *The Nutcracker*. ASFB awards over \$40,000 in financial need-based scholarships every year, to ensure that every child who wishes to dance has the opportunity to do so.

With remarkable success, Folklórico transcends cultural barriers through the art of dance. Folklórico teaches artistic excellence, promotes positive youth development, and encourages the crossing of cultural boundaries by students and their families. It represents ASFB's firm commitment to engage and inspire new generations of creative thinkers and artists.

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ASFB's dual-city structure has proven an enduring business model. It serves two geographical markets in four operational areas: performance, presentation, outreach, and education. Steeped in values of collaboration, mentorship, generosity, curiosity, and risk-taking, the hybrid model diversifies activity and revenue. With a dancer's discipline, ASFB has grown to a budget of over \$4 million, operating with a healthy ratio between earned and contributed income.

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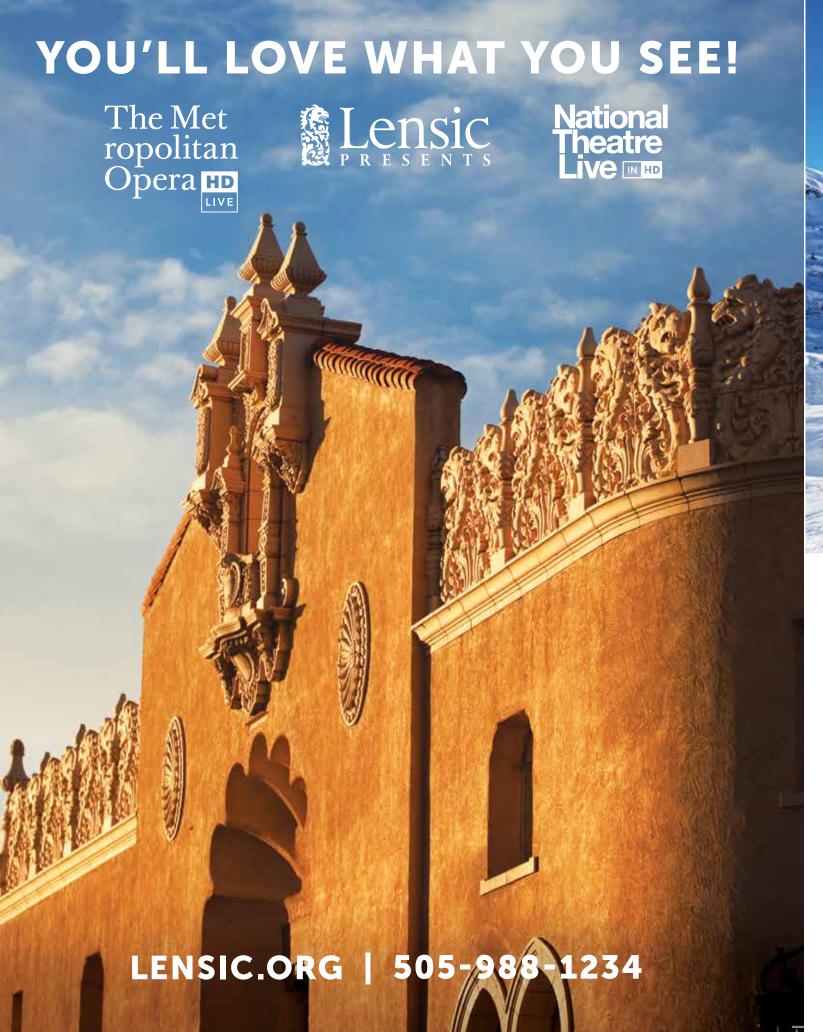
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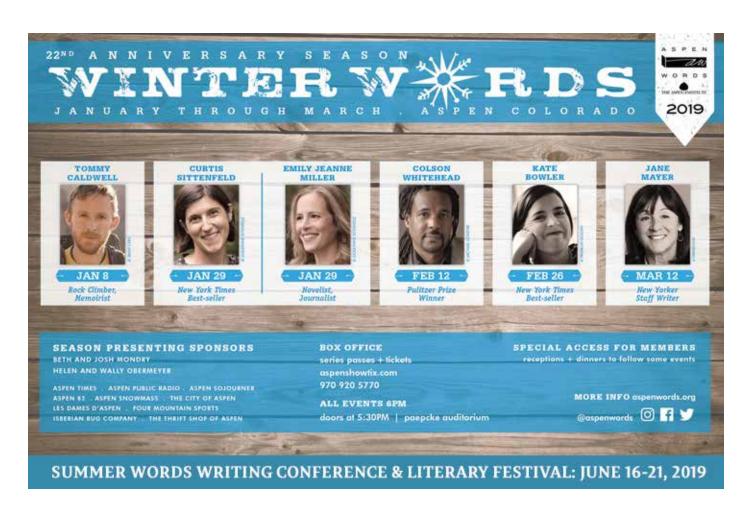
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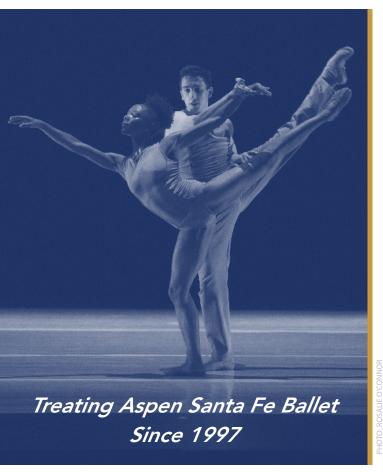




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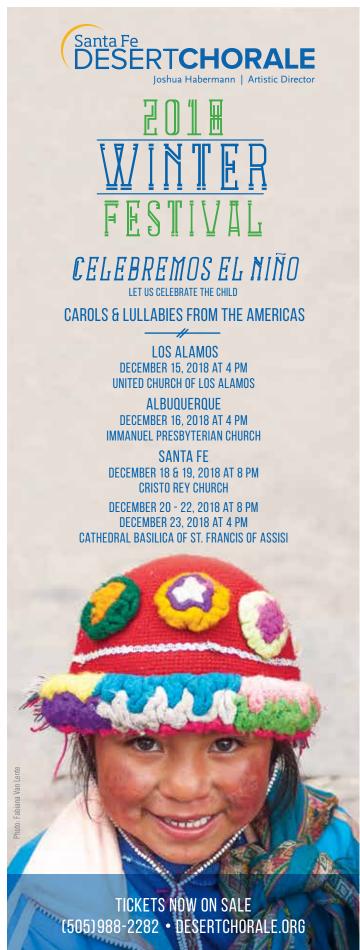




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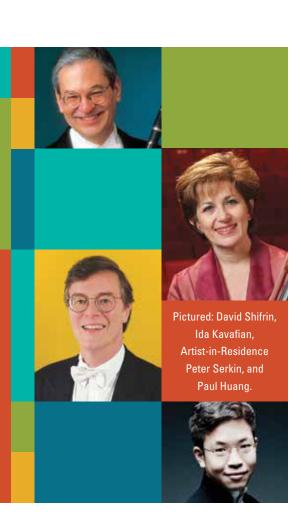
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KATHERINE BOLAÑOS sponsored by Barbara Gold

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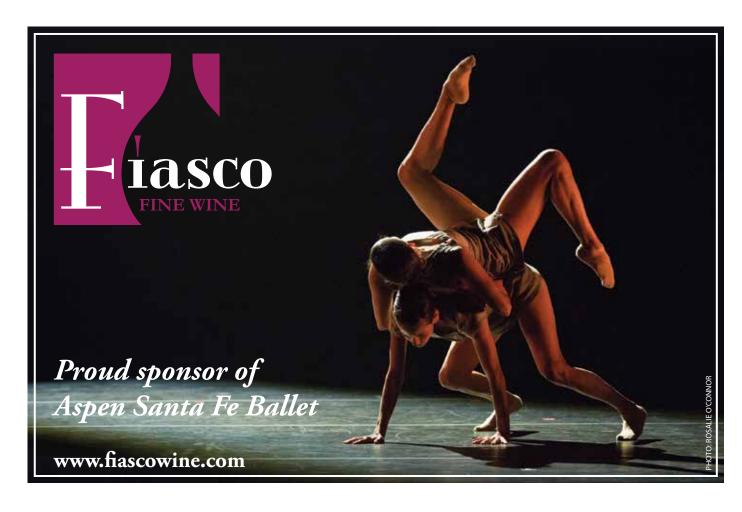
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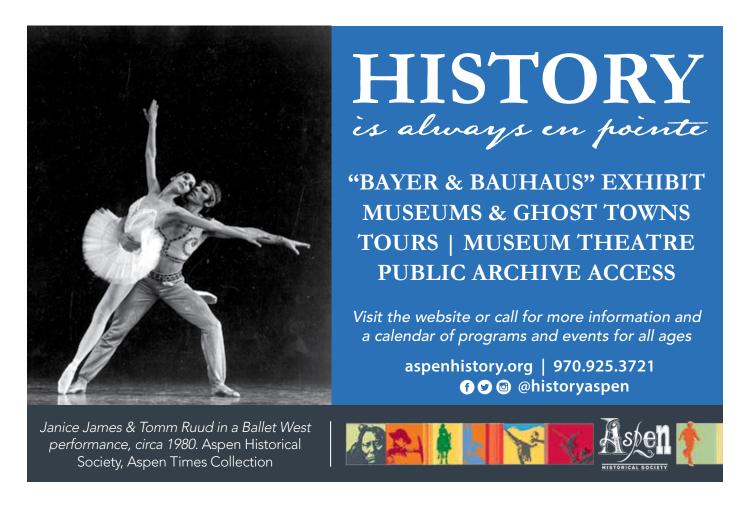










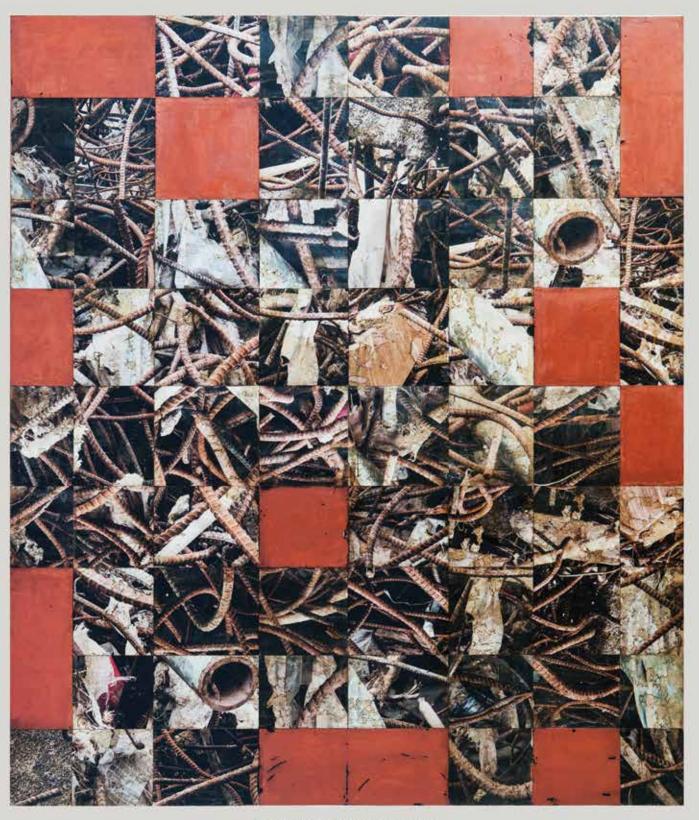


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
