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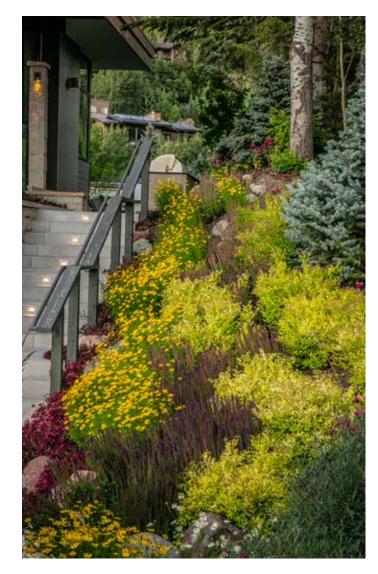
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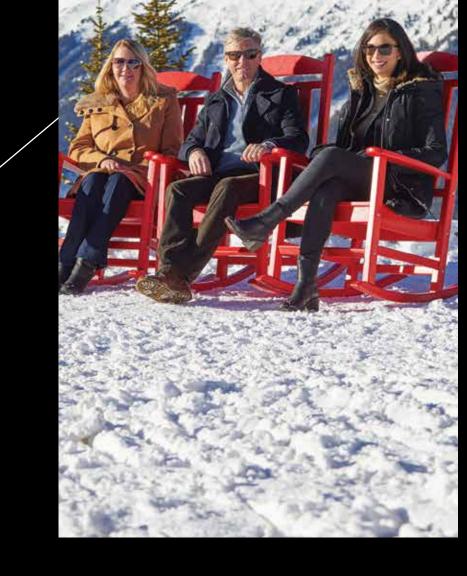


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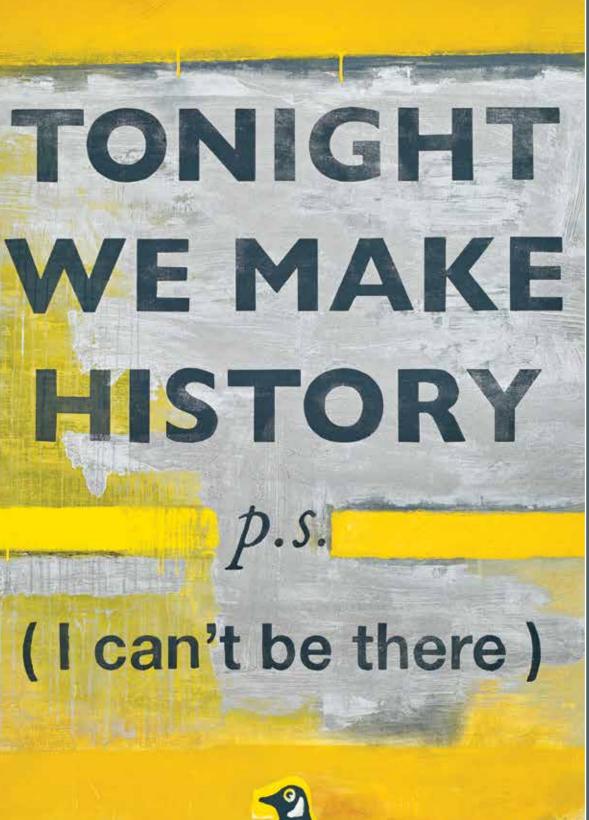
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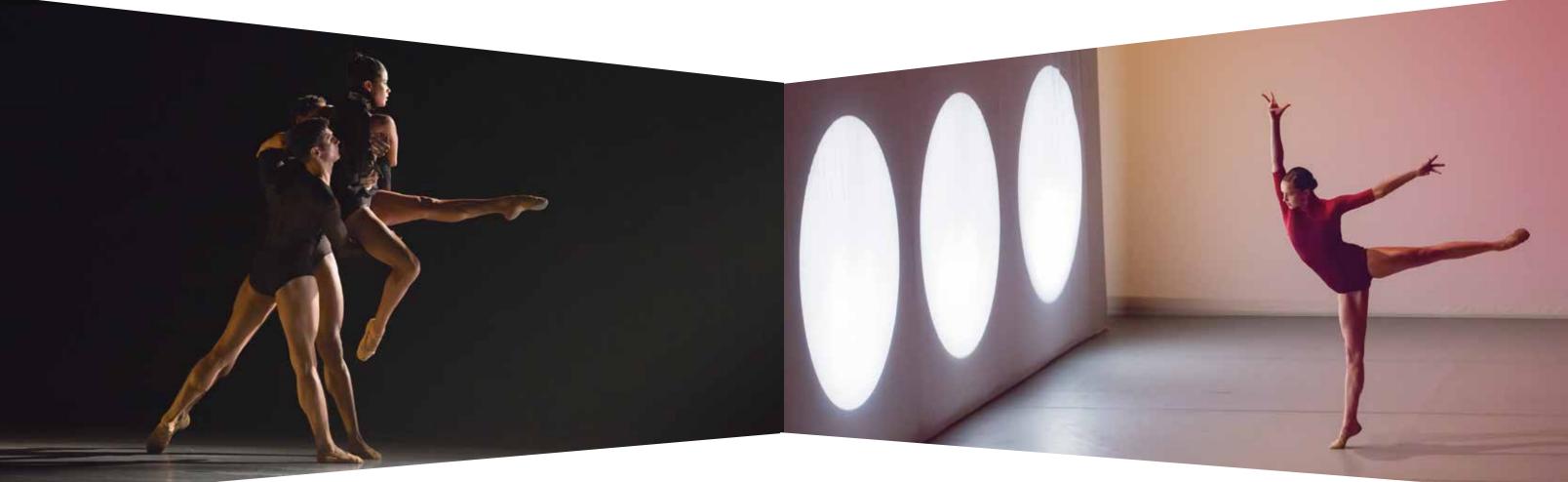
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FROM THE DIRECTORS

Dear Friends,

Welcome to Aspen Santa Fe Ballet's 24th season! It is our honor to present unique performance experiences that delight, inspire, and nourish your soul through the art of dance.

ASFB's season begins with a whimsical rendition of The Nutcracker—our biggest annual endeavor. The company's roster swells, with almost 20 additional professional performers and literally hundreds of children from the School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet joining our ranks.

This year, ASFB's sought-after Nutcracker production will debut at the stunning Younes and Soraya Nazarian Center for the Performing Arts ("The Soraya") in Los Angeles. Then we return to our snowy home cities to ring in the season together.

Our long-time audiences likely already know Los Angeles-based Diavolo, as we have presented these ingenious, hyper-athletic dancers several times before. In 2017, the troupe gained worldwide acclaim by appearing on the popular television program America's Got Talent. Led by the charismatic Jacques Heim, Diavolo's one-night-only appearance in Aspen will surely be a hot ticket.

We are thrilled to host Grupo Corpo in its Santa Fe debut. Based in Belo Horizonte, Brazil, this eclectic company rarely appears in America. Their lively shows are full of charm, wit, and an entertaining and sensual style that's simply invigorating.

Aspen Santa Fe Ballet has been busy on the road touring to Kansas City, San Luis Obispo, Livermore, Humboldt, and Vernon and Victoria in British Columbia. Further touring brings the company to Hawaii, Lincoln, Park City, and—a big moment-the company's debut in Germany. As for our repertoire, the smashing success of last summer's Beautiful Decay choreographed by Nicolo Fonte prompted its return to Aspen in February. This is an ambitious project all around, with elaborate stage design and guest performers. Its reprise gives our winter audience a chance to experience this important work.

The history of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet is rooted in education. Long before our dance company carved a space in contemporary classical ballet, our visionary founder, Bebe Schweppe, laid the groundwork for our extensive educational programs. Today we teach more than 120 classes per week and reach over 1,000 children through the educational programs of the School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet and ASFB Folklórico. Our deep commitment to providing dance education for any child who wishes to dance is reflected in our scholarship assistance program and the free classes offered by ASFB Folklórico. Year after year, these precious programs consistently define our community outreach.

Our commitment extends as well to you, our loyal dance audience. Alas, expenses continue to mount alarmingly and the cost of producing highcaliber performances in our home towns is increasing. To manage the uptick in fixed costs, we trim our budget, make frequent spending cuts, and seek to constantly renew our base of support in our small-butsophisticated communities.

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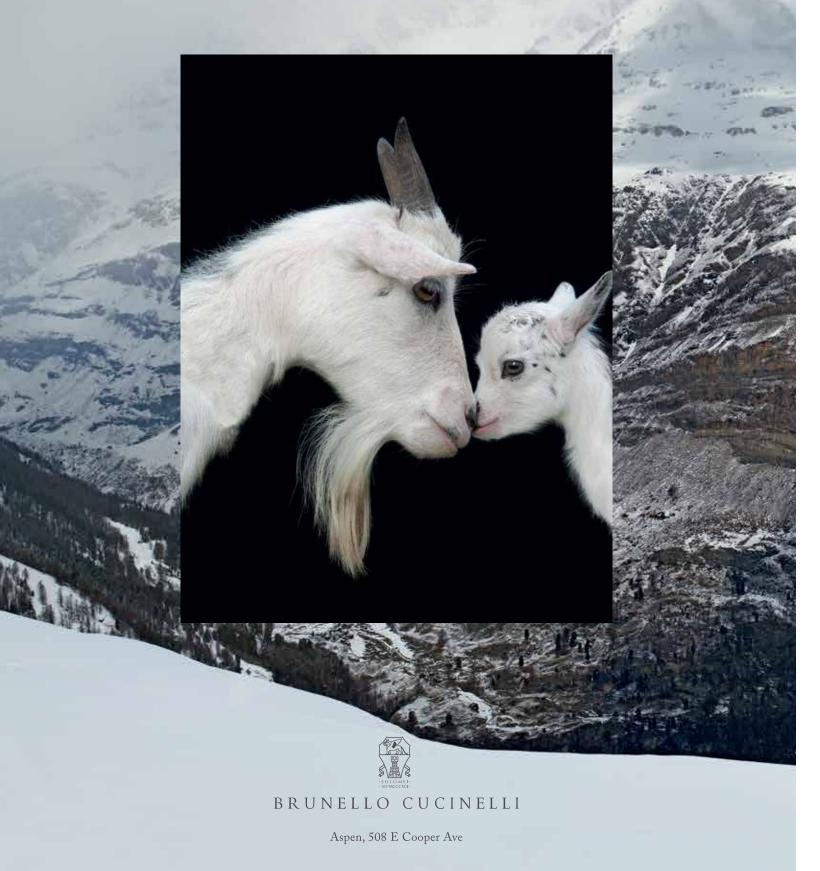

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EARLY ROOTS IN ASPEN

The Salt Lake City-based Ballet West introduced Aspen audiences to ballet in the seventies with recurring summer residencies that led to the formation of a yearround dance presenting organization. In addition to hosting guest companies during the summer, the organization offered a ballet class for locals once a week during the winter. When the ballet teacher moved away and the class was at risk of being discontinued, Bebe Schweppe, a former dancer herself, stepped up and took the reins in an effort to keep the program alive and ensure her young daughters would have access to dance classes.

Not only did she keep it alive, but within her first year nearly doubled the size program from its initial 45 students. Insisting on more than one class per week, it seemed that the more Bebe increased the rigor and structure of the program, the more people wanted to participate. "I was told that nobody from Aspen would ever come to class more than once a week and I said if 'I'm going to teach, they're going to come at least twice a week," she recalls. She transformed an existing Nutcracker showcase into a full production, undertaking the herculean task of sewing all of the costumes herself. All the while, bouncing around various studio spaces in town, Bebe harbored a vision of one day having a professional dance company in Aspen.

In 1991, Bebe incorporated her ballet school as its own non-profit-the birthday of what is now The School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet as we know it. A serendipitous meeting in the summer of 1995 at a performance of The Joffrey Ballet introduced Bebe to two men who would prove pivotal in the future of her school: Jean-Philippe Malaty and Tom Mossbrucker. The connection was immediate and she soon found herself laying out her long-held vision for an Aspen-based dance company—the rest is history.

After initially traveling to Aspen just to teach, Jean-Philippe and Tom accepted Bebe's invitation to move to Aspen in earnest and Aspen Ballet was born in 1996. As she puts it, the trio were the "Three Musketeers," with Bebe in charge of the school while Jean-Philippe and Tom got the company on its feet, hiring dancers and using professional networks to acquire those important early ballets for the fledgling troupe. Eventually Bebe stepped down, leaving the operation of the school to Jean-Philippe until a school director position was created.

With its namesake internationally-acclaimed company and over 500 children enrolled in nearly 120 classes per week in Colorado and New Mexico, it is hard to imagine that the flourishing School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet traces its roots to a seasonal once-a-week class.

ASPEN SANTA FE BALLET

A NEIGHBOR TO THE SOUTH

Before Aspen Ballet developed into an established company and school in Colorado, Gisela Genschow had already garnered a reputation as a successful teacher, co-directing the Santa Fe Dance Foundation, a school she purchased upon arriving in Santa Fe in 1992. The dance landscape of the Santa Fe area in the late nineties was sparse and opportunities to see professional companies limited, so Gisela was thrilled to receive a letter from the Aspen Ballet offering a masterclass and inviting her school to the young company's upcoming tour performance in Santa Fe. Upon arrival, Jean-Philippe and Tom were likewise delighted at the caliber of the students they found in Gisela's studio (among them was future ASFB dancer, Irene Joyce).



The directors kept in touch, striking up a friendship and inviting Gisela to teach in Aspen. In 2000, an opportunity arose to become a dual-city operation, sharing the existing Aspen Ballet with its neighbors in Santa Fe. Gisela proved instrumental in securing the connections with existing dance supporters, helping the transition to Aspen Santa Fe Ballet move smoothly. Her ballet school became the official school of ASFB in Santa Fe, creating even deeper ties to the local community. As for Gisela, she was more than happy to leave management behind and focus on teaching as the Santa Fe School Director: "When it was my studio I had to do everything, so having ASFB take over was a welcome relief."

EXPANSION AND GROWTH

In 2004, Jean-Philippe and Tom reached out to Melanie Doskocil, who had performed in ASFB's production of The Nutcracker several years before, inviting her to direct The School of ASFB in Colorado. Over the years the school experienced tremendous growth in its existing Basalt and Aspen schools, expanding into Carbondale, and eventually bringing the existing Glenwood Springs Dance Academy into the fold by 2014. Not only did the number of enrolled students increase, but the opportunities for former company dancers to teach expanded, providing an Aspen-based career alternative once a dancer's performing days were done.

In Santa Fe, the 2010 addition of Karen Brettschneider, who brought a specialization in early childhood education, expanded the school's creative movement and pre-ballet curriculum, ensuring a steady stream of children into the upper level classes.

STUDENT SUCCESS

Students from The School of ASFB have gone on to study and dance at prestigious institutions including the School of American Ballet, Jacqueline Onassis School, Joffrey School, Bolshoi Ballet School, North Carolina School for the Arts, and Interlochen. Others pursued professional careers with New York City Ballet, Washington Ballet, Pittsburgh Ballet Theater, The Julliard School, San Francisco Ballet, and Pacific Northwest Ballet.

But The School of ASFB isn't exclusively for aspiring dancers. In fact, the majority of students will put their dance background on the shelf once they graduate high school. So what keeps these tireless teachers motivated if not grooming the next generation of pros? A strong belief in the value of dance education for all students, no matter their future career aspirations. After 15 years of teaching, Melanie continues to draw inspiration from her students: "Hearing them say how much they got from being a part of the ballet school, the strength of character, the life skills, and the lessons learned—even if they didn't pursue dancing—those are the rewards that keep me going year after year."

Now 25 years old and working in New York City, Cassie Lewis is just one example of a student whose ballet training opened up doors she never imagined. Cassie started in The School of ASFB at the age of four, training with Melanie, Tom, and Jean-Philippe until graduating from Aspen High School. She attended the joint Ailey/Fordham program in New York, completing degrees in both dance and behavioral economics. After dancing professionally around New York

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and Canada, Cassie came full circle, returning to Aspen to dance in The Nutcracker in 2017. Cassie now lives and works in New York in a role that blends her legal and financial training.

Cassie often gets asked in interviews, or in professional circles how her background as a dancer led her to a seemingly unrelated career. She explains: "Being a ballet dancer makes you an ideal employee; you are highly disciplined, dedicated, creative, unflappable, excellent at taking and applying criticism; you perform well under pressure, know how to present yourself, are insanely hard working, and are always striving to be the best you can be. It has everything to do with not just with my day to day responsibilities, but with who I am as a person and as a business woman."

Would she change anything about the years of her life she dedicated to dance? "Unsurprisingly, it was a huge commitment, both of time and energy, but I wouldn't change a thing. I was able to pursue a passion to its limit, get paid to do it, and then leave feeling fulfilled. How many others in their mid-twenties can say that they have had the privilege to do that? I feel very lucky, but it is not luck, rather it is my training and the tenacity that ballet gave me that brought me to this point."

BALLET FOR ALL AGES

The educational opportunities provided by the School are not strictly restricted to children 18 and under. With multiple adult ballet classes offered in both Colorado and New Mexico, dancers of all ages and abilities can enjoy the discipline and training that comes from ballet and many of these classes have developed a devoted following. Gisela reports that the Santa Fe school has one adult dancer in her

seventies who "I swear, since the first day I took the studio over, she has taken every single class. She takes at least two or three classes a week. She is an inspiration to all of us!"

Jessica Hite of Aspen practically grew up in the School of ASFB, dancing from the ages of three to eighteen. Now an adult with a busy career in town, she not only continues to support ASFB by serving on the National Council, but also maintains her connection by attending adult ballet classes. "The impact the school had on me growing up was so profound that I asked Jean-Philippe and Tom to write my college recommendation letters," she said. "Now, I look forward to every performance, gala, and adult ballet class as a way to support local arts and continue to stay in touch with my earliest passion: dance."

BREAKING BOUNDARIES

One might be forgiven for thinking that the school associated with a contemporary ballet company is solely focused on the instruction of classical dance forms, but ASFB has a history of doing things that other companies do not. Not long after the addition of Santa Fe school, ASFB's educational underpinnings branched out beyond ballet, taking root in both the Colorado and New Mexico communities via a groundbreaking outreach program: ASFB Folklórico. Founded in 1998, this after-school program crosses cultural boundaries through free instruction in Mexican folkloric dance.



Under the dedicated leadership of director Francisco "Paco" Nevarez-Burgueño for the last nineteen years, the program has grown to serve 400 students in 13 locations in the Roaring Fork Valley and Santa Fe public schools. With the invaluable support of Santa Fe instructor Mauricio Lopez, the award-winning advanced performing group boasts festival appearances both domestically and in Latin America, but performance opportunities abound closer to home. The group is a fixture at the annual Dia De Los Muertos celebration in Carbondale, the Fiesta de Tamales for English

in Action, the New Mexico School for the Deaf, the Virgin of Guadalupe holiday at Santa Maria de la Paz, and the Denver Art Museum and Colorado History Museum's Día del Niño festivities.

DANCE IS FOR EVERYONE

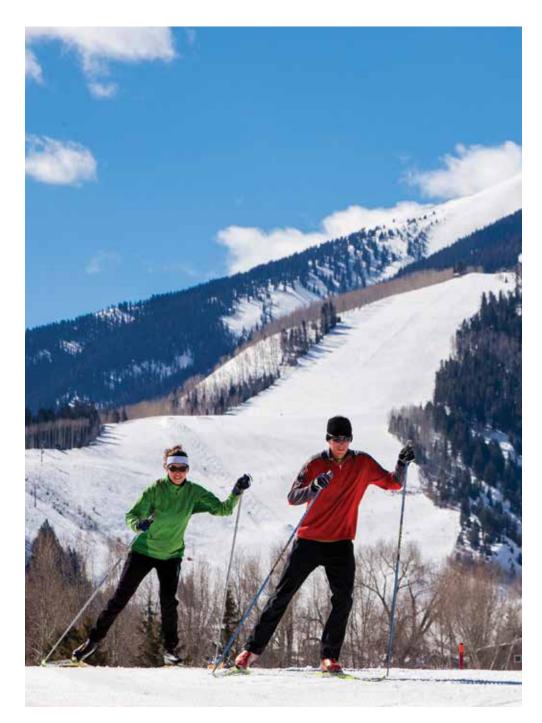
ASFB's focus on education extends beyond the confines of our two home communities. Masterclasses led by company dancers or directors are an integral part of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet's touring itinerary, allowing the company to connect with communities around the world beyond the performance. Special matinee performances organized as school field trips in select cities allow for children to attend engaging lecture/demonstrations where students learn about how dancers train, enjoy a performance of an accessible work from the company's repertoire, and interact with the dancers through Q&A. For many children, this is their very first experience in a theater.

Through generous donations from foundations and individuals, The School of ASFB is able to award over \$40,000 in scholarship funds annually. Know that every time you purchase a cookie or refreshment at a performance, or take home a Nutcracker statue from the boutique, you are directly contributing to ASFB's educational initiatives, ensuring that the Folklórico program remains free to all

participants and that aspiring dance students are able to afford school tuition.

The very foundation of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet is dance education. What you see on stage today would not possible without the work of our schools, which have been inspiring new generations of dancers and audiences since 1991.

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ASPEN SANTA FE BALLET HISTORY

Ballet's dynamic story in the American West

In 1996, Aspen Santa Fe Ballet Founder Bebe Schweppe invited Tom Mossbrucker and Jean-Philippe Malaty to create a ballet company in Aspen. A unique, multidimensional arts organization developed rapidly from the ballet school Schweppe had established in the Rocky Mountains. "Bebe's vision for Aspen to have its own ballet company was the project of a lifetime," says Malaty, ASFB's Executive Director. "We embarked together on a serendipitous adventure. More than twenty years later, the connection between the dancers and our two communities is deep and inextricable."

Forging a new frontier

The company began modestly with seven dancers. Growth was organic. Friends in the field—Gerald Arpino, Trey McIntyre, Septime Webre, Dwight Rhoden—offered start-up repertoire. Moses Pendleton's popular *Noir Blanc* was a seminal event for the young ASFB. It launched a tradition of commissioning new works. An open, exploratory style emerged as Mossbrucker and Malaty tapped the creative scene in Europe where classical ballet was breaking from its boundaries. The athletic

and adventurous American dancers found themselves at a crossroads of dance history. The divide between ballet and modern dance was dissolving.

Innovative business model

In 2000, the Aspen, Colorado-based ballet company forged a dual-city relationship with Santa Fe, New Mexico, broadening its scope and lending crucial revenue diversification. Under this hybrid business model, a roster of arts activities flourishes year-round in both cities. Performance, education, presentation, and community outreach all join in the mix. In 2014, ASFB shared resources with a local troupe, Juan Siddi Flamenco Santa Fe (JSFSF). This entrepreneurial project led to artistic heights at Jacob's Pillow and New York's Joyce Theater. Fortified with new experience and relationships, JSFSF continues to thrive in its own right.

New commissions

ASFB's mission places highest priority on developing new dance works and nurturing relationships with emerging choreographers. The company fostered the early careers of now in-demand global dance makers like Nicolo Fonte (eight commissioned Fonte works in the ASFB repertoire), Jorma Elo (four commissioned Elo works), Edwaard Liang, Jacopo Godani, Helen Pickett, Cayetano Soto, Alejandro Cerrudo, and others. Works by late 20th century masters—William Forsythe, Jiří Kylián, Twyla Tharp—round out the repertoire.

"We value building relationships with choreographers who become integral to the company. The natural beauty of our surroundings has a profound impact on creativity. Our choreographers find it inspiring to create here," says Mossbrucker, ASFB's Artistic Director.

Renowned in the U.S. & abroad

Based in the American West, ASFB occupies the vanguard of its field, brandishing a strong national reputation. Repeat engagements at the American Dance Festival, Harris Theater for Music and Dance, Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Joyce Theater, The Kennedy Center, Saratoga Performing Arts Center, and Wolf Trap testify to the company's popularity and ability to please audiences. The company has toured overseas as well, with prestigious invitations and bookings in Brazil, Canada, France, Greece, Guatemala, Israel, Italy, and Russia. Premier funders—National Endowment for the Arts, New England Foundation for the Arts / National Dance Project, Joyce Foundation, Shubert Foundation, Wolf Trap Foundation, Jerome Robbins Foundation, and Princess Grace Foundation have supported ASFB's growth.

Into a bright future

Since its founding in 1996, ASFB has carved a reputation as a dance-lover's dance company. It has genuinely reshaped the field, introducing new choreographic talent to national stages, fostering a new breed of exceptional dancer, and stimulating audiences with high-caliber performances. Fueled by an annual budget of over \$4 million and an endowment nearly twice that size, the company's strong artistic vision is supported by solid financial footing.

JEAN-PHILIPPE MALATY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Jean-Philippe was born in the Basque region of France; after receiving his baccalaureate in dance, he accepted scholarships to study at Mudra, Maurice Béjart's school in Brussels, and at John Cranko's ballet academy in Stuttgart. Invited by acclaimed instructor David Howard to study in New York, Jean-Philippe traveled to America under Howard's tutelage. Jean-Philippe's performance career began with Joffrey II. He also danced as a guest artist with Los Angeles Classical Ballet, Ballet Hispanico, and the Lyric Opera of Chicago. Jean-Philippe segued from the stage to an administrative role while still in his twenties. A key member of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet's start-up team, Jean-Philippe has been central to developing the company's unique dual-city-based hybrid business model. He directs operations in two locations, overseeing a \$4 million budget that he allocates to the company, two schools, an esteemed presenting series, and an award-winning folkloric outreach program. Jean-Philippe's first love is teaching and, when his schedule permits, he conducts master classes at schools and universities. He has served on panels for the Colorado Council for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts. In 2013, Jean-Philippe shared an honor with Artistic Director Tom Mossbrucker when the Santa Fe Community Foundation bestowed its Piñon Award on the company. In 2012, the Denver-based Bonfils-Stanton Foundation granted Jean-Philippe a Livingston Fellowship in recognition of his significant leadership role in Colorado's non-profit sector. In 2010, in recognition of ASFB's contribution to the field of dance, Jean-Philippe and Tom were honored with the Joyce Theater Foundation Award. A naturalized U.S. citizen, Jean-Philippe is proud to have forged a company alive with American energy, invention, and eclecticism.

Tom has been artistic director of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet since 1996. Over the course of his career, he has built a prestigious arts organization sharing two homes in Aspen and Santa Fe. In his role as artistic director, Tom cultivates highly sophisticated and challenging works of contemporary ballet. His shining achievement is ASFB's roster of over 30 ballets created on commission by leading global choreographers. Tom began to dance at age four, studying tap in his hometown of Tacoma, Washington. He pursued classical ballet training at the School of American Ballet and Joffrey Ballet School. His 20 years as a principal dancer with the Joffrey Ballet, performing in over 70 ballets under the direct coaching of founders Robert Joffrey and Gerald Arpino, coincided with a period of high artistic achievement for the company. Tom danced in ballets by great twentieth century choreographers: Fredrick Ashton, George Balanchine, Laura Dean, William Forsythe, Jiří Kylián, Mark Morris, Paul Taylor, and Twyla Tharp. Signature roles included lago in Jose Limon's The Moor's Pavane; Champion Roper in Agnes DeMille's Rodeo; Billy in Eugene Loring's Billy the Kid; and Romeo in John Cranko's Romeo and Juliet. It is this rich dance background that Tom brings to coaching dancers today. In 2013, Tom shared an honor with Executive Director Jean-Philippe Malaty when the Santa Fe Community Foundation bestowed its Piñon Award on the company. In 2010, in recognition of ASFB's contribution to the field of dance, Tom and Jean-Philippe were honored with the Joyce Theater Foundation Award. A former board member of Dance USA, Tom currently serves on the board of The Gerald Arpino and Robert Joffrey Foundation.

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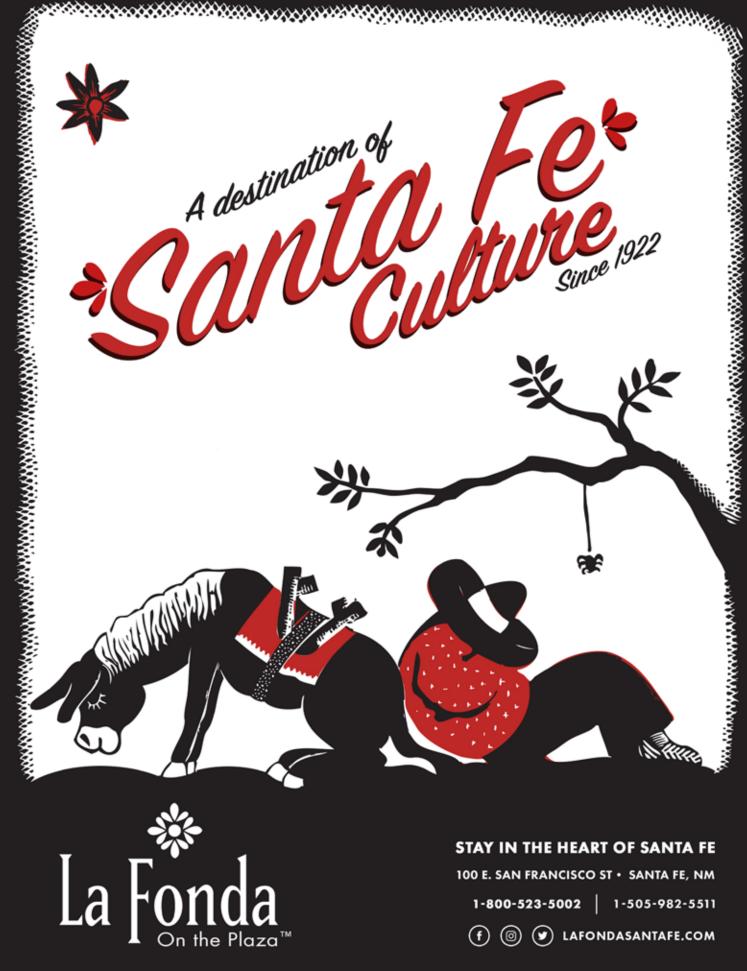
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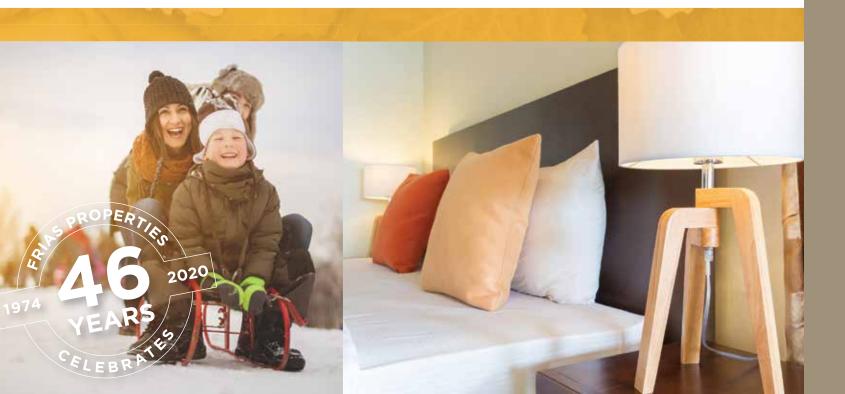
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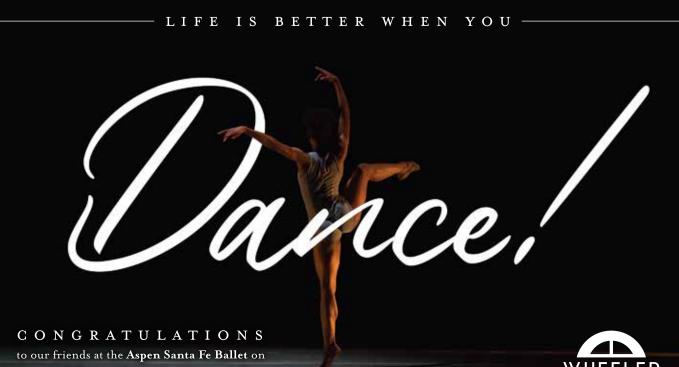


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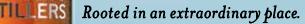




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SCHOOL +OUTREACH

THE SCHOOL OF ASPEN SANTA FE BALLET operates at the core of a multifaceted arts organization. From its beginning when Founder Bebe Schweppe taught ballet in a small Aspen studio, the school has expanded to year-round classes in Aspen, Basalt, Carbondale, Glenwood Springs, and Santa Fe, teaching more than 600 students of all ages.

Offering a curriculum of ballet, jazz, and modern dance, The School of Aspen Santa Fe Ballet provides quality training for the preprofessional student as well as the recreational dancer, and has guided many young dancers into professional careers. The school fosters a supportive environment that enhances confidence and accomplishment in addition to technique and artistry. Students perform in an annual spring recital and alongside ASFB's professional dancers in The Nutcracker. ASFB awards over \$40,000 in financial need-based scholarships every year, to ensure that every child who wishes to dance has the opportunity to do so.

ASFB FOLKLÓRICO enriches the lives of children through free, afterschool instruction in Mexican folkloric dance. ASFB founded Folklórico in 1998 with a goal of engaging the community with high quality arts outreach. Folklórico now directly impacts the lives of 380 students, grades K-12 in Basalt, Carbondale, Glenwood Springs, Rifle, and Santa Fe public schools. The award-winning Folklórico ensemble performs regularly across the region.

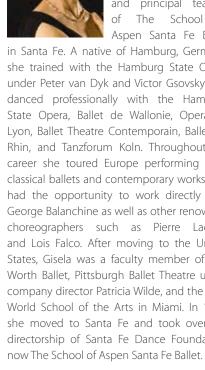

Francisco (Paco) Nevárez-Burgueño became part of

Compania de Danza Folklórica in Chihuahua, Mexico at the age of 14, dancing from 1978 to 1990 under the direction of Leonor Avalos Zaragoza. During this time, he learned a large repertoire of traditional and popular Mexican dances, costume design, choreography, lighting and set design. After immigrating to the US in 1990, Nevarez-Burgueño founded his own Folklórico dance company for adults and children in the New York City metro area, Mexico: Images and Traditions Folkloric Group. He was also the Princeton University Ballet Folklórico Artistic Director from 2000 to 2002. ASFB recruited Nevárez-Burgueño in 2002 to direct the Folklórico after-school program; the program has won numerous awards and accolades under his leadership. In 2016 Colorado Creative Industries recognized Nevárez-Burgueño with its Governor's Creative Leadership Award.

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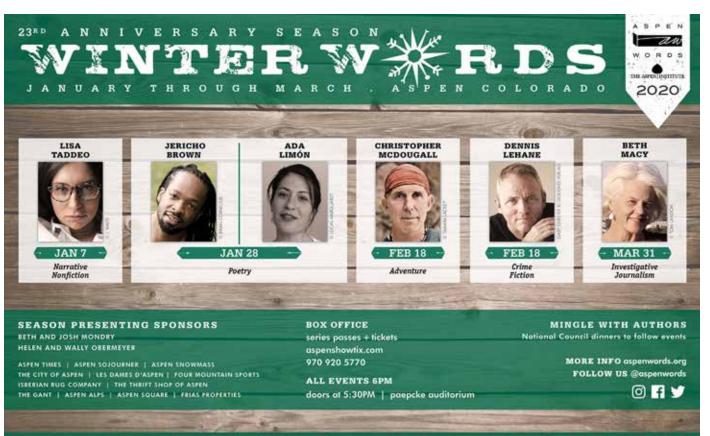


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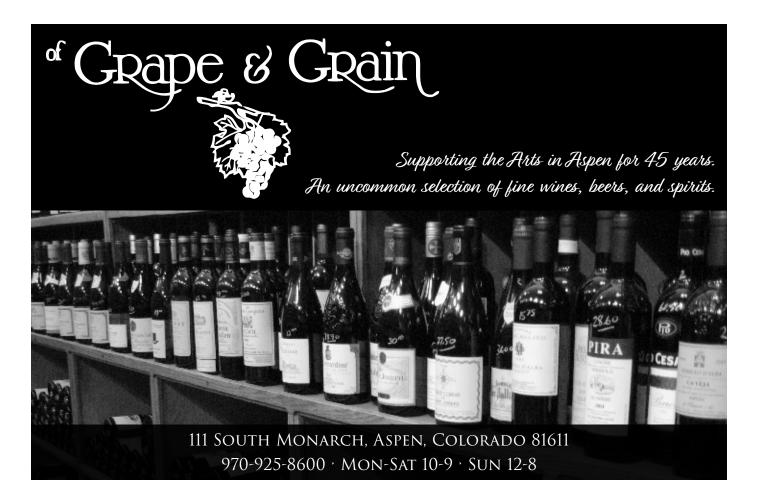
